Hi All 😊



Thank you for reading the second edition of our newsletter for 2020 and boy what a year we are having starting with the fires/floods and now COVID-19 and Black Lives Matter.

COVID-19 has disrupted our normal way of life in ways we could not have imagined. At MLAHMC this placed extra burden on how we conduct our business in these unprecedented times ensuring the safety of both our staff and tenants. MLAHMC introduced our "working from home arrangements plan" as our measure to limit the potential of spreading COVID-19, given the large area of operation we work across.

To assist our tenancies, we implemented the following initiatives to ease rental pressure:

- 6-month delayed rent increases scheduled for May 2020
- Implementation of a new short-term hardship assistance for those tenants who have lost their job due to the impacts of COVID-19 Pandemic

It was great to see communities take the lead and work on their own local strategies including but not limited to Murrin Bridge/Lake Cargelligo, Wilcannia and Brewarrina just to name a few.

I can't stress how important it is to use good practices to slow the spread COVID-19 (see below some tips from Health NSW) so please take care of yourself, your family & friends and to the wider community.

The Black Lives Matter movement is gaining momentum across the globe and for us especially in Australia, we see the injustices faced by Aboriginal people and alarming statistics including deaths in police custody which has increased by 150% since the royal commission, also as an Aboriginal person you are 14.8 times more likely to be incarcerated than your non-indigenous peers and our youth making up 48% of all juveniles in custody. As disheartening as these statistics are, as a race we are very resilient and we're still here to tell our story and to fight for better conditions for ourselves, our kids, their kids and every other generation to come.

In more positive news, AHO in line with their Growth Provider strategy has announced the successful EOI applicants and MLAHMC was named as one of the Growth Aboriginal Community Housing Providers (ACHP's). A well done to the MLAHMC team for the effort and we see this as an opportunity to continually improve the service delivery to all our tenants

New Homes for Elders in Goodooga

At the beginning of April 2020, MLAHMC received four new homes in the remote community of Goodooga for management. These homes were made for elders and are specially designed and modified for easy access including; ramps, wider doorways for easy accessibility for mobility devises and adaptable kitchens and bathrooms to suit the individual needs of tenants.

The modular units were built by the Aboriginal Housing Office (AHO) in partnership with the Corrective Services Industry (CSI) under the Gundi Program. The Gundi program is a partnership program between AHO and CSI that enables the construction of affordable housing for Indigenous communities by Indigenous inmates who are supervised and trained by qualified tradesman. This program seeks to upskill participants in practical skills and formal TAFE qualifications in a range of construction-related jobs, improving employment prospects for these individuals post release. The individuals involved in this project received 18,700 hours of construction training and gained a sense of accomplishment by giving back to community by building much needed elder's flats for the small town of Goodooga.

MLAHMC is pleased that from the ground up, from the handover process to the management of these tenancies, this project to provide *quality and sustainable housing* in the community of Goodooga has been achieved through the collaboration of Aboriginal organisations and programs providing essential housing services to Aboriginal people in a remote community.

MLAHMC takes pride in having the ability to house people on country and having the capacity to provide a service to remote Aboriginal communities across New South Wales (NSW). Here's two of our new Goodooga tenants below and what they think of their new units.

What do you love about your Community?

I was born, raised and went to school in Goodooga. People from my community are friendly and are both my family and friends. Overall, Goodooga is a good community.

Service and Support Spotlight

Victims Services

Victims Services is a program funded by NSW Government that helps people who are victims of crime in NSW with information and referrals. Victim Services provides assistance to individuals to access support under the Victims Support Scheme, including;

Financial Assistance

 Financial assistance for economic losses, including out of pocket expenses, loss of actual earnings, medical and dental expenses, justicerelated expenses, and assistance relating to the loss of or damage to personal effects such as clothing.









 Recognition payment financial assistance for immediate needs (up to \$5000) for expenses incurred urgently to secure the victim's safety, health and wellbeing.

Recognition Payment

• Fixed payments of \$1,500 to \$15,000 to recognise the trauma caused to the victim and the offence or offences committed against them.

Counselling

22 hours of free counselling or more if needed.

Employment Related Accommodation

Applying for ERA

To apply for ERA you must

- be an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person over 18 years old
 have a family connection to remote NSW
- prove your enrolment in an education or training course at an approved institution such as university or TAFE or
- show that the potential employer offers long-term opportunities

What are the houses like?

ERA accommodation is similar to student accommodation at universities and TAFE NSW.

If you're a single person taking up this option you will move into a fully furnished share-accommodation house. You will have your own room and share the living, kitchen, laundry and bathroom areas with other people in similar situations.

If you have a family and you take up an opportunity to work or study in a regional centre, you can take your immediate family with you. Accommodation will be unfurnished so that you can bring your own belongings with
